Community Development--Pest Control as Temperatures Drop

As temperatures continue to drop and winter approaches, rats and mice begin to look for shelter inside. Unfortunately, this can cause serious problems for residents and businesses who unknowingly house these rodents over the next few months. Rats and mice look for warm, more insulated places in order to get through the winter, which is why they are commonly found in areas such as inside walls, cluttered basements, and crawlspaces.

There are multiple tips to identify if you are experiencing a rodent issue. Temporarily moving furnishings and storage to check for clues, such as the presence of fecal matter, is a good place to start. Rodent fecal matter is most commonly found near food. Another sign of rats or mice may be chewing marks on doors or cords. If you have any reason to believe rats are hiding in your home, do an exterior inspection and promptly cover any gaps that are at least as big as a quarter. A huge reason why rodents may decide to pay your home a visit involves the handling of food and trash. Make sure your trash cans all have secure lids, and immediately clean up uneaten pet food.

The City of Peoria offers a program to bait alleyways and other exterior areas at no cost to citizens. Please call the Code Enforcement front desk at 309.494-8654 if you are experiencing an issue with rats. The City of Peoria has a contract with Peoria Pest Eliminators who will evaluate the area, identify causes, and bait existing burrows. What you need to know about Mosquitoes  **What are Bed Bugs?**  **All about Rodents** 

Mosquitoes spread the West Nile virus, encephalitis and the Zika virus.

What is Zika?
The Zika virus is spread by a mosquito not common to our area. People who contract Zika rarely become ill enough to go to a hospital from the disease and the condition is rarely fatal. However, Zika infection during pregnancy may be linked to birth defects.

What is West Nile?
The West Nile virus can cause encephalitis, a brain inflammation, and has been found in our area. Most people infected with West Nile do not know they have it having experienced only mild symptoms before recovery.

Bed bugs are small insects that feed on human blood, usually while we sleep. Adult bed bugs have flat, rusty-red-colored oval bodies, about the size of an apple seed.

They hide in cracks in furniture, floors, or walls, and can survive several months without feeding. When they feed, their bodies swell and become a bright red similar to a tick.

Rats are destructive, bite people, and are hosts to ectoparasites including fleas, mites, and ticks that transmit disease.

Signs of rat infestation include small, pellet shaped droppings, evidence of gnawing on containers of food, runways, and burrows.

Mosquitoes



Standing water is fertile breeding ground for mosquitoes. Drain water from places like old tires, buckets, birdbaths and even culverts and roadside ditches. Install screens on windows and doors and use mosquito repellent when outside.



Zika virus

Pregnant women should delay travel to areas where Zika is spreading. Symptoms include fever, rash, joint pain, or red eyes that occur either during a trip or within 2 weeks after traveling to a Zika infected area.

West Nile virus

Symptoms may include headache, high fever, stiff neck, confusion, muscle weakness, tremors, convulsions, coma, and paralysis. These may last several weeks and neurological effects may be permanent.

Bed Bugs



- Keep beds pulled away from walls, furniture and curtains.
- Keep the floor under and around beds free of clutter.
- Change sheets and pillow cases weekly.
- When traveling, inspect seams of the mattress and keep your bags and luggage off the floor and bed.
- If infested with bed bugs, vacuum infested areas (including mattresses and box springs) and dispose of contents in a sealed garbage bag or trash container.
- Remove pillows, sheets, blankets, mattress, and box springs.
- Wash sheets, blankets and mattress pads.

Pesticides can be applied into cracks and crevices harboring bed bugs. Avoid applying pesticides to surfaces of mattresses, bedding, or furniture that will come in contact with people.

Rodents



- Remove pet food and water immediately after feeding and store in rat proof containers.
- Keep trash in a container with a tight-fitting lid and dispose of animal waste.
- Seal openings in your home larger than a half inch in diameter around doors, windows, foundations, and places where wires and pipes enter the house.
- Clear all tall weeds, debris, and brush.
- Poison rats with prepared anticoagulants that can be found at hardware stores and grocery stores.
- Place bait along driveways, walls and burrows. Keep children and pets away from poison bait.
- Trapping rats is an alternative to using poison. Bait traps with candy or soft food and then check and reset them daily.

PeoriaCorps--City of Peoria Launches AmeriCorps Program



On Tuesday, October 24 at 10:00 a.m., the City of Peoria officially launched PeoriaCorps, a six month program engaging 10 residents, ages 18-24. Following a welcome by Mayor Ardis, participants took the AmeriCorps pledge. This career track program will combine education, green infrastructure maintenance and job readiness.

The City of Peoria Public Works Department has proposed green infrastructure solutions for the

city's wet weather issues to minimize stormwater runoff. Elements of green infrastructure include pervious pavers, rain gardens and bioswales, all designed to capture rainwater before it gets into our infrastructure. Focusing on learning about and maintaining green infrastructure projects throughout the city, PeoriaCorps members will, at the conclusion of the program, receive credentials in green infrastructure construction, maintenance and inspection through the National Green Infrastructure Certification Program (NGICP).

PeoriaCorps Program Director, Jamila Wilson touted the multifaceted approach the program has for the participants. "PeoriaCorps represents the city's investment not only in addressing the wet weather challenges the city faces, but also the investment in young people by building a labor force for the emerging industry of green infrastructure in our region." She continued, "This is an important moment in our city's redevelopment - creating opportunities for our youth as well as making our river water safer through the construction and maintenance of green infrastructure."

PeoriaCorps developed when members of the City of Peoria Innovation Team (i-team) met with an advisory committee comprised of community organizations, business leaders, government officials and other stakeholders. The Department of Public Works will oversee the program. Director of Public Works, Scott Reese stated, "We are looking forward to working with PeoriaCorps not only on green infrastructure, but to also introduce these young people to career opportunities within our city."

The funding for the program was made possible through an AmeriCorps grant through the Corporation for National and Community Service, in addition to an Apprenticeship Plus Youth grant through the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. Both were secured by the i-team. Participants were selected through an interview process and had to meet the criteria of being out of school and unemployed for six months. In addition to the certificate, they will receive an allowance through the grant funding.

Tireless Project, Saturday, October 28

The Tireless Project will hold its monthly collection of unwanted tires on Saturday, October 28. The collection site is located at Jimax, 2000 W Clark St. Please note: this is for PEORIA CITY RESIDENTS ONLY; hours of collection are 9:00–11:00 a.m. (may end earlier if the trailer is at capacity—approximately 1,000 tires). If tires are left after the designated hours, a \$200 fine for littering will be enforced.

Please note the following restrictions to the drop-off:

- The limit is 20 tires per customer; this is a legal requirement for transporting tires.
- First 10 tires are FREE; there is a \$1.00 charge for each tire over 10—CASH ONLY. (Funds will be used for project supplies and neighborhood cleanups.)
- Only City of Peoria residents can participate; no businesses will be allowed.

- Customers must have proof of residency in the form of a driver's license, state ID OR property tax statement.
- No tires with rims will be accepted.
- Only passenger and truck tires 17" or less will be accepted; no oversized tires, including agricultural and commercial, will be accepted.

The Tireless Project, initiated in 2015 by Peoria volunteers, successfully collected approximately 3,800 tires in their inaugural year. In July of 2017, JIMAX volunteered to take over the collection. For further information, please contact James Kosner 309.253.0192.

i-team--City of Peoria and Fresh Coast Capital break ground on new stormwater farm, The Well Farm at Voris Field

The Well Farm is part of the City's work leveraging green solutions to prevent overflow from the city's sewer system



Peoria, Illinois – October 26, 2017 – The City of Peoria, Fresh Coast Capital, and the gifts in the moment (gitm) Foundation hosted a groundbreaking and naming ceremony today for a “stormwater farm” in Peoria’s 1st District. The Well Farm at Voris Field will feature green infrastructure, such as flowering

bioswales and a stormwater forest, to absorb excess storm water and prevent sewer overflow. It will also serve as an urban farm and a training program for youth and other residents. A community barbeque followed the festivities to educate residents about the new project and deepen their engagement with the City's green infrastructure.

The effort is part of the Peoria Innovation Team's (i-team) work to help the City demonstrate how green solutions can help reduce overflow from the City's combined sewer system while enriching community life and expanding opportunity for residents.

Speaking at the groundbreaking and naming ceremony, Mayor Jim Ardis discussed the program as one that will take a vacant public lot and turn it into a community asset. Mayor Ardis also noted that the program builds partnerships and leverages public and private resources find more cost-effective solutions to solve complex challenges. Also speaking at the event, Councilwoman Denise Moore spoke of the importance of the program to the First District.

April Mendez, Cofounder and VP of Community Partnerships at Fresh Coast Capital, added that Fresh Coast Capital has "been honored to be a partner to the community and the City in developing this program and can't wait to see this site begin to take shape as construction, planting and apprenticeship training begin."

Speaking at the event, gitm Foundation's Dwayne Harris explained that The Well Farm's urban agriculture apprentices will help care for the farm while also learning business skills. "This groundbreaking ceremony marks the beginning of the construction of not just what the site will look like, but of the community we build around it."

The project is sited at 1013 Southwest Reed Avenue on a City-owned parcel that has sat vacant for many years despite attempts to develop it. Construction on the site will begin this fall and continue through spring. A formal ribbon-cutting ceremony will take place in the spring when the site is planted with these flowering plants, trees, and grasses.

Last year, the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) awarded Fresh Coast Capital with the City of Peoria, gitm Foundation, and AKRF \$1 million in funds to install an urban agriculture and stormwater management project in Peoria. This grant funding was met with \$1 million in matching funds and resources. Since the initial award, the City of Peoria with Fresh Coast Capital, gitm Foundation, and AKRF have led a stakeholder advisory group to develop plans for the site. Youth and adult residents will be trained in urban farming and agribusiness skills on the site. The gitm Foundation's Urban Agriculture Apprenticeship Program will take 20 participants each year who will cultivate produce, cut flowers, and learn how to sell their products.

The stormwater farm complements other efforts by the Peoria i-team such as Peoria Corps, a job training program for maintaining and developing green storm water infrastructure for young residents who have been out of school and unemployed. The Peoria i-team is part of the Bloomberg Philanthropies i-teams program to help cities solve problems in new ways to deliver better results for residents.

Announcing the name of the site selected by a group of local residents, Michael Jackson explained that "the name incorporates the site's history. It is a part of property that was purchased in 1835 by two brothers, Francis and Samuel Voris, who came to Peoria because they believed that the City's rich soil would allow them to farm and produce a great harvest." The name selected indicates the "many benefits of the farm, from helping to clean our water to being a working farm that creates direct opportunities for

residents to learn to grow and sell their own harvest, to increasing health and wellness by providing fresh food and a calming space.”

This project is supported by the Natural Resources Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, under an NRCS Conservation Innovation Grant.

“This Well Farm project exemplifies the type of innovation that we want to support through the Conservation Innovation Grants program,” said Kari Cohen, Director of the Conservation Innovations Team at NRCS. “The integration of green infrastructure, agriculture and agroforestry has the potential to deliver enormous benefits to Peoria and similar communities throughout the Nation.”

Green Infrastructure is the use of nature – including trees, plants, and soil – to manage water from storms. The result is often reduced flooding and fewer sewer overflows. Because the site is located in the combined sewer area of the City, the addition of green infrastructure to the site may help reduce sewage overflows to the Illinois River as well as local flooding.

Peoria Public Schools – Update from Superintendent Dr. Sharon Desmoulin-Kherat

The two-year process of research and discussion on the possibility of a Balanced School-Year Calendar implementation for Peoria Public Schools begins on Thursday, November 2 from 6 to 7 p.m. with impact group meetings, led by each group’s captain(s).

The five Impact Groups formed to study the implications of a Balanced Calendar will meet at each Group Captain’s school locations starting in early November.

The first step in a two-year process, the five committees will involve interested stakeholders exploring possibilities, including the investigation of potential improvements and impacts that a balanced calendar/non-traditional school calendar may offer students of Peoria Public Schools.

Impact Groups will consist of stakeholders including families, staff and community members and will engage in dialogue to determine pros, cons, considerations and possibilities for each group topic. The building principals who are members of the balanced calendar committee will serve as impact group captains to facilitate discussion, gather input and share with district administration.

The five impact groups, group captains and meeting site are:

- Athletic/extra-curricular activities, Dr. Annette Coleman, Peoria High School
- Staffing/collective bargaining units, human resources, Mrs. Cindy Clark and Mrs. Noly Branscumb, Glen Oak Community Learning Center
- Building/Grounds, Mr. Tom Blumer, Lincoln K-8
- Community activities/family life, Mr. Ken Turner, Kellar Primary School
- Students/Academic life/Achievement, Mrs. Laura Rodgers, Mark Bills Middle School

During the first meeting members will introduce themselves; review the charge I have presented to the groups, and the impact group responsibilities, topics and timeline. Members will then brainstorm

On Halloween, and Every Day, Impaired Driving is Scary *Peoria Police Department is Cracking Down on Drunk Drivers*

Peoria, IL – This Halloween, The Peoria Police Department is cracking down on impaired drivers with an aggressive *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* enforcement effort and is giving a fair warning to holiday revelers: Keep the party off the road.

“On Halloween, we urge you to beware of impaired driving,” said Lt. McCall. “Driving impaired by alcohol or drugs is deadly, it is illegal and it will get you pulled over and arrested this Halloween.”

According to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates, more than 300 people were killed in alcohol-impaired motor vehicle crashes in each of the last three years in Illinois. In 2014, 302 people lost their lives in crashes involving at least one driver with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .08 or above. In 2015, that number rose slightly to 315 and remained the same in 2016. Just one DUI arrest could cost an estimated \$18,000 or more and result in revoked driving privileges for up to a year.

The *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* enforcement campaign urges everyone to follow these simple tips to help keep our roads safe during Halloween:

- Plan a safe way to get home before you attend a party.
- Designate a sober driver, take public transportation, use your favorite ride-sharing service, or call a sober friend or family member to get home.

- Walking while impaired can be just as dangerous as driving impaired. Designate a sober friend to walk you home.
- If you see an impaired driver on the road, contact local law enforcement as soon as it is safe to do so.
- If you see an impaired person about to drive, take their keys and help them get home safely.

The Halloween enforcement effort is made possible by federal traffic safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation.
