City Manager's Office--City of Peoria Launches 2018 Budget Challenge

The City of Peoria has launched the 2018 Online Budget Challenge, an interactive tool that invites residents and business owners to experience the type of policy choices involved in balancing the city's budget. The Budget Challenge can be taken at www.peoria.budgetchallenge.org

The Budget Challenge will empower residents to decide how they would best allocate dollars across city services. Participants will begin with the current deficit amount and that amount will increase or decrease, depending on their spending choices. The goal of each participant will be to balance the budget. The City is facing a \$7.9 million budget deficit for 2018. Residents are encouraged to take the online challenge and provide their thoughts. The survey will be open until September 30, 2017.

The city will also host public budget discussions in the upcoming weeks. Each presentation will include an overview of the budget, the online tool and the opportunity to talk to Department Heads. Paper comment cards will be also available at each budget meeting. Residents without internet access may utilize computers at any of the Peoria Public Library locations to take the challenge. Feedback from the meetings and results of the online challenge will be presented to the City Council in preparation of their upcoming budget planning sessions.

The 2017-2018 school year is underway. Now is a great time for parents, guardians and grandparents to become an active participant in their students’ school.

The district calendar and handbook which was sent to all families in early August, lists Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) meetings for each school. For the next few weeks, each school PTO will meet for the first time. I strongly encourage you to attend these meetings.

The rewards far outweigh the time commitment. Becoming an active participant in your child's school PTO sends a clear signal to your student that their education and academic success is a priority in your home. We know from our intensive work in Social Emotional Learning (SEL) that every child needs at least one adult in their lives who is consistently involved and checking on their child's wellbeing and progress in school. Being active in PTO is another wonderful way to keep that connection with your child strong and also to connect with other adults who care about your child.

Getting to know other parents in your school community is a great resource for you. Parenting is stressful job and having the fellowship and friendship of other parents goes a long way toward reducing that stress. Most Peoria Public School PTO organizations have a Facebook page to allow you to keep up with activities.

Being an active PTO member also sends a clear signal to school staff particularly classroom teachers. A strong, proactive group of parents who support the work of teachers by hosting fund-raisers, and promoting and volunteering at school events, makes their job easier and more rewarding.

PTO organizations are not limited to parents – grandparents, aunts, uncles or other guardians in our students' lives are always welcome to pitch in and help.

Invest Health & Community Conversation on Health

Meeting Summary

- On July 20, 2017, a community meeting to discuss a “Healthy Southside” was held at the Lincoln Branch Library.
- Invitations were mailed to residents of the Near Southside (MacArthur, King, Jefferson, Western). Other individuals with an interest in community health were also invited to the meeting.
- Approximately 50 people attended the meeting. Of the total attendees, around 40 were residents of the Southside.
- The meeting attendees were asked, “WHAT DOES THE SOUTHSIDE NEED TO BE A HEALTHIER COMMUNITY?”
 - “Need” was defined as basic required needs, and not something that is “wanted,” but not needed. One may “want” a new car, but one “needs” reliable transportation, etc.
 - “Health” was defined as not just the absence of physical illness, but an overall feeling of wellness in the community.
- The “WHAT” Question – attendees were asked to suggest what would be needed to make the Southside a healthier community. Various suggestions were made and written on individual sheets of paper by City staff.
- The attendees were invited to vote on what they thought the most important “wants” were by using sticky dots. Residents of the Southside were given 4 votes each (distributed as they wanted). All other attendees were given 1 vote.
- After voting, the “wants” were put in order of popularity based on the total number of votes.
- The “HOW” Question – attendees were asked to suggest how the top few want statements could be implemented. The input was again written down by City Staff.
- Going Forward – a follow-up meeting will be scheduled in September to review the results of the July 20, meeting and to continue the conversation on health.



This Labor Day, the Peoria Police Department Reminds Motorists to *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over*

Peoria, IL — The end of summer is traditionally marked by the Labor Day holiday, often celebrated through picnics, pool parties and other gatherings. Sadly, the Labor Day holiday also can be one of the deadliest because of motor vehicle crashes related to drunk and drug-impaired drivers.

Once again, the Peoria Police Department is joining the Illinois Department of Transportation to stop drunk and drug-impaired drivers and help save lives. The high-visibility enforcement campaign, “Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over,” runs from Aug. 21 through the early morning hours of Sept. 5. During this period, law enforcement across the state will show zero tolerance for impaired driving. Officers also will be looking for seat-belt law violators. This comprehensive effort aims to reduce impaired driving and help make zero fatalities a reality on Illinois roads.

National statistics show a frightening trend in drunk driving. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 10,265 people were killed in drunk-driving crashes in 2015, an increase from 9,967 people killed in 2014. This is why the Peoria Police Department is working with IDOT to remind drivers that drunk driving is not only illegal, it is a matter of life and death.

“Driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs is a massive problem in Illinois with more than 300 people dying annually,” said Lt. McCall. “Alcohol- or drug-impaired driving is not acceptable behavior. It is essential to plan a sober ride home before you go out. We make zero exceptions for impaired driving. There are just no excuses.”

The Peoria Police Department recommends the following safe alternatives to drinking and driving:

- If you will be drinking, designate a sober driver before you go out.
- Plan to use public transportation, call a cab or use a ride-sharing service to get home safely.
- If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact the Peoria Police Department at **1-309-673-4521**.
- Have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

The 2017 Labor Day “Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over” campaign is funded by federal highway safety funds from NHTSA and managed through IDOT.
