### **Community Development Department – 100 Blocks in 100 Days Recap**

Peoria, IL-The City of Peoria Community Development Department successfully completed “100 Blocks in 100 Days,” a campaign launched in March that familiarized residents with their area’s Code Enforcement Aides within a 100 day period. ### **The Tireless Project May 27**

The Tireless Project will hold its monthly collection of unwanted tires this Saturday, May 27. The collection site, located at 2301 S. Darst St., Peoria, is for PEORIA CITY RESIDENTS ONLY; hours of collection are 9:00–11:00 a.m. (may end earlier if the trailer is at capacity—approximately 1,000 tires). If tires are left after the designated hours, a \$200 fine for littering will be enforced.

Please note the following restrictions to the drop-off:

- The limit is 20 tires per customer; this is a legal requirement for transporting tires.
- First 10 tires are FREE; there is a \$1.00 charge for each tire over 10—CASH ONLY. (Funds will be used for project supplies and neighborhood cleanups.)
- Only City of Peoria residents can participate; no businesses will be allowed.
- Customers must have proof of residency in the form of a driver's license, state ID OR property tax statement.
- No tires with rims will be accepted.
- Only passenger and truck tires 17" or less will be accepted; no oversized tires, including agricultural and commercial, will be accepted.

The Tireless Project, initiated in 2015 by Peoria volunteers, successfully collected approximately 3,800 tires in their inaugural year.

### **Peoria Public Schools—Update from Superintendent Desmoulin-Kherat**

Thursday, May 25 is the last day of school for Peoria Public School students. Our Summer School program is at capacity with nearly 600 students registered and more on a waiting list. For kindergarten, first and second grade students, the morning academics will focus on reading and math. For third through eighth grade students, morning academics will focus on STEM subjects. Afternoons will be a combination of activities and fine arts. English Language Learners and high school students will be recovering credits.

This week we also introduced The Remarkable Readers program to encourage our K-8<sup>th</sup> grade students to keep up with reading. It is crucial for children to read regularly during the summer months. When students don't read during the summer, their reading skills can backtrack as much as three months and that loss of skills is cumulative – in other words, the loss of reading skills becomes more troublesome each summer that passes. Just like the muscles in our body, we must regularly exercise our brains to keep them working at peak level.

The Remarkable Readers program aims to prevent that loss of skills. Each Peoria Public School student who successfully reads a minimum of 30 minutes, four times each week and records their reading on The Remarkable Reader tracking form will be entered into the Remarkable Readers raffle. Students must read all eleven week of the summer and turn their completed form into their teacher during the first week of the 2017-2018 year.

Students must note the title of the book, make a brief note on the subject and have the form signed by a parent or guardian.

Raffle winners will be drawn in September and winners will be recognized at a September Board of Education meeting. A winner will be chosen from each grade level. In truth, every student who meets the goals of reading for 30 minutes a day, four days a week, will be a winner because they will return to school with their brains ready to learn. Students who successfully complete all eleven weeks will read a minimum 1,320 minutes or 22 hours!

**The Peoria Fire Department is committed to protecting the lives and property of the citizens of Peoria. We meet this commitment daily by providing comprehensive fire prevention, fire suppression, and emergency medical/rescue services.**

### From the Chief

It is an absolute honor and pleasure to present the 2016 Annual Report for the Peoria Fire Department. This has been an extremely busy year for your Peoria Fire Department, as the following report will show. The Peoria Firefighters unconditionally serve our community in many diverse services. We provide fire suppression, emergency medical services (three stations at the Advanced Life Support-Paramedic level), hazardous materials response (at the highest certification level in the State), technical rescue technicians (confined spaces, trench rescue, high-angle rope rescue, and low-angle rope rescue), underwater rescue and recovery, fire prevention and public education. Our response numbers steadily rise each year, and 2016 was no exception. The Department has implemented new software programs for our fire reports and emergency medical reports, along with new computers in the apparatus. We were able to accomplish this due to our aggressive pursuit of a \$333,500 Assistance to Firefighters Grant through FEMA. We are building a solid Succession Plan and have developed a strong, dynamic Strategic Plan for a true vision for the Peoria Fire Department.

I am truly humbled and proud to be a part of such a great, committed and dedicated department.

### What is Accreditation and What Does it Mean for the Peoria Fire Department?

In 2016, we set out to become an accredited agency through the Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE). This is a process in which the Peoria Fire Department (PFD) will look at every function within the department. In simple terms, we will evaluate how we did things in the past, how we are currently doing things, and how we plan on improving on them in the future. In accreditation terms, we will:

- 1) Develop a community risk assessment
- 2) Create goals and objectives
- 3) Create a standard of cover document
- 4) Evaluate our agency's performance
- 5) Write a strategic plan for the department

All of this will be done to create a self-assessment manual for the PFD. To accomplish this task, the PFD will spend approximately 2000 man hours researching and getting all of our written documents in order. Next we will present them to a review board from CPSE and can expect to spend up to 1300 more

hours doing corrections to our documents. After we have completed this stage, we will then defend our document before a review board in order to become an accredited department.

We feel this is important to do because the accreditation process will give us a chance to evaluate all of the practices and policies of the PFD. Self-assessment will give us a look at our best practices and show us what we are doing well and where we need to improve. The PFD will have to ask some hard questions and answer them with solid data as opposed to emotion. It will give us the ability to see how we compare to other fire departments when it comes to their best practices. Upon completion, we will have examined all aspects of the PFD and either will have made immediate improvements, or set a plan in motion for improvement in the future. Accreditation is a long and tedious process that will take a couple of years to complete. Once awarded, accreditation status is for a five year term with annual compliance reporting. Accreditation is an ongoing quality improvement process, not a project with an end.

As with everything we do on the PFD, we are tackling this process with a strong labor/management committee and we believe we will be a better department not only now, but in the future, by completing this task.



## 2016 Budget







# Fire Cadet Program Recruiting



In 2016, we reactivated the Fire Cadet Program after nearly a twenty year hiatus. The 36-month program is designed to provide 19 to 21 year old Peoria residents with an opportunity to learn about a career in Fire Service. Cadets are exposed to a plethora of duties such as fire suppression, fire and life safety education, emergency medical services, fire investigations, fire inspections, hazardous materials inspections/mitigation, and water rescue operations. Currently, we have three participants in the program. In 2017, we are planning to hire three additional cadets.

The Fire Cadet Program is intended to reach kids earlier and develop new and diverse talent, giving them a sense of what it is like to be a firefighter. "We need to bring more people to the table. That means talking to younger kids to prepare them for a rewarding career in the future," said Chief Lauss. The program is just a part of the overall recruiting process which reaches out to the entire community.

The Peoria Fire Department has aggressively engaged in an all-out recruitment effort for the purpose of establishing a diversified workforce that reflects the demographics of the community. In 2016, recruiters attended 29 career fairs throughout Illinois to spread the message of inclusion.

## NEW in 2016

- The PFD purchased two new E-One engines with a 1250 gpm capacity. These will replace a 1994 engine with 131,503 miles and a 1995 engine with 106,503 miles.
- Twenty sets of new fire gear were purchased to equip the new recruits.
- The PFD purchased a drone this year. Using a drone, first responders can, within minutes, get a full view of an incident from the air, allowing deployment of resources quicker and the ability to make decisions based on a live feed. Usually, firefighters have to rush into a blaze or disaster scene with very little information – often knowing little about the size and scope of the fire, nor how many potential victims may be cut off from rescue.

A major goal of the PFD is to reduce potential health hazards and protect the lives of its firefighters. A firefighter's turnout gear can truly make the difference between life and death or serious injury, so having structurally sound gear is imperative for their safety and welfare. In addition to protection from heat and fire related injuries, turnout gear can also protect from dangerous carcinogens. Cancer is a major risk for firefighters. The National Fire Protection Association requires the replacement of turnout gear every ten years.

In our efforts to care for and replace fire gear, the PFD:

- Submitted a grant application to FEMA-Assistance to Firefighters for \$279,812 to purchase fifty-two sets of fire gear and four Washer/Extractors and four Dryers for cleaning turnout gear.
- Received a \$2,500 grant from Illinois Ameren for fire gear.

# Fire Safety and Prevention

The Peoria Fire Department's commitment to protect lives and property includes fire prevention and safety awareness measures which are under the direction of Division Chief of Prevention, Phillip Maclin. The Prevention Division runs numerous public education programs for children and adults. Fire Prevention week in October is a big event. Tours are available at fire stations to learn about fire safety and what firefighters do.

Fire safety inspections are done to ensure fire protection features and codes are in place. These inspections help diminish fire hazards and reduce property loss, deaths and injuries due to fire. The PFD maintains a Class 2 ISO rating, which is one measure of their overall effectiveness. Only 3% of fire departments nationwide hold a Class 2 or higher.

Peoria Fire Department has a free smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm installation program. On average, 100 devices are properly placed and installed annually. The Department received a \$700 grant from Illinois American Water to buy smoke detectors. The Hazmat Division also received a \$1,000 grant from Enbridge Pipeline to buy two hydrogen cyanide detectors.

# Fire Investigations


The PFD strives to improve the safety and welfare of firefighters and citizens by determining the origin and cause of fires. When arson is suspected, comprehensive fire scene investigations may lead to the arrest and prosecution of involved persons. The department has three full-time Investigators, of which two are Certified Arson Investigators. Arson investigators are recognized by the State of Illinois and the City of Peoria as Peace Officers. This Peace Officer status provides the Arson Investigators with police powers. The third individual serves in the capacity as a Certified Fire Investigator and will begin the Arson Investigator certification process later this year. All fire related incidents are examined by Investigators, Battalion Chiefs or Captains. In 2016, the Peoria Fire Department Office of Fire Investigation conducted analysis for 110 fire incidents. This represented an increase of 45% over last year's number of 76. For 2016, arson increased by a margin of 78% and in December, there were ten arson fires, representing an increase of 25% from the previous year.

## Madison Theater



A fire, believed to be arson, severely damaged the historic 96-year-old Madison Theater in downtown Peoria. Crews responded to the theater at 11 p.m. on a Saturday night where 35 firefighters worked the scene, some until 2 a.m. Sunday. Heavy smoke poured from the roof and upper-story windows. Firefighters extinguished flames on and around the stage area and in the basement. No injuries were reported and damage was estimated at \$100,000.

## Fire Training



Chief Paul Brodkorb, Division Chief of Training

Division Chief of Training, Paul Brodkorb manages the operation, development, planning, execution, and evaluation of all training for the Department. Records are kept to ensure certification requirements are met and continuing education units are maintained. During 2016, the Peoria Fire Department Training Academy conducted two recruit classes, each ten weeks in length. The first class was from April 8th to June 11th.

This class consisted of thirteen PFD recruits, two interns from Western Illinois University, one Rock Falls, Illinois Fire Department recruit and one student from the Pekin Fire Department. The second class was from October 10th to December 16th. This class consisted of seven PFD recruits, three PFD cadets, one intern from Western Illinois University and one Bloomington, Illinois Fire Department recruit. All told, the PFD hired twenty new recruits in 2016 and three cadets. These were not additional positions, but were to fill open spots from retirements. Only the three cadets were new positions.

In 2016, the Training Academy oversaw the delivery of approximately 115 hours of training per firefighter, which is more than 22,000 hours. In addition to training new recruits to the Fire Service, the Peoria Fire Department Training Academy also provides training for all firefighters

on a number of subjects including firefighting, EMS, hazardous materials, technical rescue, and underwater rescue. Required EMS training helps the department provide quality pre-hospital care to Peoria residents. The Academy acted as a host and conducted training for numerous governmental and private organizations and hosted fund raising events for PAWS, St. Jude and Autism Awareness.

The City of Peoria receives 12 cents of every Property Tax Dollar. Of that 12 cents, the Fire Department receives 3.75 cents. On a property tax bill of \$1,000, \$37.50 goes to the Fire Department, on a \$2,000 property tax bill, \$75 would go to the Fire Department and so on. In return, taxpayers receive:

- 24 hour service, 7 days a week
- rapid response to fire and medical emergencies, including vehicle accidents
- first rate medical care
- hazardous material mitigation
- fire prevention education
- fire/arson investigation
- fire code inspections
- technical rescue operations
- underwater/swift water rescue

## Office of Emergency Management

The Peoria Fire Department's Office of Emergency Management (OEM) is one of approximately 25 accredited municipal emergency management agencies in the State of Illinois. The OEM consists of the Director/Fire Chief Charles Lauss, the Emergency Management Coordinator, Michael Vaughn and a dedicated group of volunteer weather spotters/emergency radio operators.

During 2016, the OEM has been involved with other community partners to better maintain our Emergency Operations Plan. The OEM participates with federal, state, and other local community partners in various coalitions and committees. These organizations are focused on our community being better prepared if faced with a local disaster, whether natural or man-made.

In 2016, the OEM applied for and the City of Peoria was selected to attend a training course on a whole community's response to a complex coordinated attack. The OEM is also working with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency to obtain a grant from FEMA based on this topic involving a three year training opportunity for our various community response partners. While it is unfortunate that we have to worry about this type of an event, it is fortunate that we are making every effort to insure our community is ready to respond.

# RESPONSE TIMES

The Peoria Fire Department strives to respond to each call as quickly and safely as possible in order to save lives, reduce injuries and minimize property damage. Response times are a critical performance measurement. In general, response times are measured in three segments –

- Alarm handling time** is measured from when the 9-1-1 call is received in the Dispatch Center until the transmittal of the response information to the fire station.
- Turnout time** is the amount of time from when the fire station and firefighters are notified of a call until the beginning point of travel time.
- Travel time** is calculated from the time the crew leaves the fire station to the time it arrives on scene.

**Fire response time** is the sum of turnout time and travel time.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), through the consensus of industry experts, drafts standards which help to save lives and reduce loss. NFPA 1710 sets the following standard for response times in minutes:

Fire response time is the sum of turnout and travel time. The NFPA standard for this is 5:20 minutes. The PFD has an average fire response time of 4:19 minutes. The quicker we can safely arrive on scenes, the better the care for medical patients and more fire damage we can prevent.

As you move farther north, travel times increase as a result of larger geographic areas and a lower fire station-to-square mile ratio. Destinations are often farther away and response times are affected by winding roads that are less direct than the straight grid systems in other neighborhoods.





EMS responses have increased 253% and now make up 83% of calls, while staffing has been maintained at 206 sworn fire fighters/EMTs.







The roadway will be reopened prior to Peoria School District 150 resuming operations in August.


