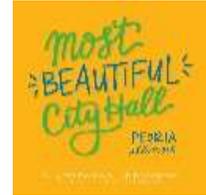

**Pick Up Peoria—Monday Lunchtime Litter Pick Up**



Lunchtime litter collection continues this Monday at noon, City Hall. Grabbers, vests, buckets will be provided.

**Community Development— Community Development Homeless Services Grant & Continuum of Care Efforts - Update**

On February 27, 2018, Mayor Ardis presented a proclamation recognizing the Heart of Illinois Homeless Continuum of Care and the Heart of Illinois United Way. These organizations, alongside several partners, coordinated the implementation of an interim shelter system in Peoria. This program model provides 24/7 interim housing (shelter) and comprehensive case management with the goal of finding permanent housing for clients. This newly established system represents the 'front-end' of the homeless response system in Peoria. The Continuum of Care in collaboration with the City and several other partners continues to grow and develop its permanent housing resources, or the 'back-end' of the homeless response system in Peoria.

The Community Development Department directly supports these efforts with the City's HUD Emergency Solutions Grant allocation. A portion of this funding is sub-granted to South Side Office of Concern (SSOC) for the operation of a Rapid Rehousing Program. Rapid Rehousing is a national best practice for moving individuals and families from homelessness to permanent housing. The program provides temporary rental assistance and other forms of housing assistance (security deposits, utilities, etc.). It also provides comprehensive case management geared toward long-term, self-sufficient housing stability in the private

market. SSOC moved 25 households from homelessness into permanent housing with the City's 2017 sub-grant.

The Continuum also manages grants for permanent supportive housing (PSH) that flow directly from HUD to the Continuum. Permanent supportive housing is a long-term housing option for individuals and clients with higher vulnerability levels that have been homeless longer and have a disability. Consistent with national best practices, the Continuum governing board strategically converted several grants from transitional to permanent housing. This action resulted in an increase of 115 additional permanent beds throughout the Continuum. Factored into this number is the additional funding of ten new permanent supportive housing units awarded to South Side Office of Concern through the 2017 HUD grant cycle.

The Continuum has been recently recognized for strategic work on the front-end of the homeless response system. However, the consortium also continues to develop and strengthen its resources on the back end in its effort to end homelessness in our community.

### **Economic Development--Startup In A Day – New On-line Software to Stream-lining the Permit Process 24/7**

We are testing and preparing to launch a new businesses portal (GovPermit.com) in the next few weeks that will stream-line the permitting process. We ask that you go through the portal and offer feedback by April 1.

GovPermit.com is a one-stop, on-line portal for businesses and citizens to:

- Submit permits
- Obtain licenses
- Become a vendor
- Seek business incentives

The software is designed to help users find, fill, and submit their applications on-line, 24/7. Please give GovPermit.com a try. Feel free to establish your profile and project (fake not real), answer the queries, and submit your application/s through the platform. Once you hit the submit button for your project, the system will supply you will completed permits.

### **Information Systems—Staying Safe During Tax Season**

Though Benjamin Franklin is often quoted as saying “in this world, nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes,” an updated version for the current day would need to include tax scams. As people nationwide seek to file their tax returns, cybercriminals attempt to take advantage of this with a variety of scams. Hundreds of thousands of U.S. citizens are targeted by tax scams each year, often only learning of the crime after having their legitimate returns rejected by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) because scammers have already fraudulently filed taxes in their name. The IRS reported a 400% rise in phishing scams from the 2015 to the 2016 tax season. In the state, local, tribal, and territorial government sector during 2017, approximately 30% of all reported data breach incidents were related to the theft of W-2 information, which was likely used for tax fraud

And here is a story about Public Works Public Relations that showed up in the Peoria, Illinois *Journal Star*.

“Two-year-old Lincoln Vespa was sledding down this driveway with his dad when a City of Peoria snow plow driver made his way through the Oakbrook subdivision. He watched the driver, Greg Gudat, go up and down his street, enthralled by the big plow truck, and Gudat took notice. Gudat honked his horn and Lincoln just about waved his little hand off. When Gudat finished clearing the street, he stopped to say hello to Lincoln and his dad Chris Vespa, and he offered the boy a squishy miniature Public Works truck. ‘He said, Nice to meet you, and waved,’ Vespa said, explaining that his son was stuck

on that phrase this week. ‘He was happy as a clam. I think it’s the little things like that that make work fun. I bet that guy has a blast handing those little trucks out to kids.’”

The Department of Public Works started handing out the toy trucks last summer after another little boy — this one wearing his own hard hat—was excited to see the city trucks outside his house. Matthew Savage was filling cracks in the street that day and pulled out a light-up traffic cone key chain. He asked the boy’s mother if he could give him a “T-O-Y,” spelling it out so her son wouldn’t be disappointed if she said no. ‘She said yes and he was tickled to death to get that little light,’ Sav-age said. That’s when he proposed the idea of passing out some sort of toy to the kids they meet on the job, hoping to build a better relationship with the public. The city workers also carry stickers that say ‘Junior Public Works Volunteer.’ Vespa said he thinks the pro-gram is fantastic and unexpected, and he wanted to thank Gudat for bringing Lincoln the truck. ‘I don’t think enough of us take the time to comment on the good people,’ he said.

### **Peoria Public Schools – Update from Superintendent Dr. Sharon Desmoulin-Kherat**

Adopt-A-School program shows two years of growth, innovation

Two years ago this month, we announced an exciting new partnership with the Junior League of Peoria (JLP) to revitalize Peoria Public Schools Adopt-A-School program. JLP provided a three-year grant to fund an Adopt-A-School coordinator position within the PPS Foundation, which was filled by Sarah Oakford.

PPS Adopt-A-School has expanded in scope and in the number of partner organizations. The program currently has 98 community-based partners with 1,396 volunteers serving PPS. The types of programming is as varied as the partners, filling so many needs for our students, from donations of basic necessities like food, clothing and hygiene products to exposure to cultural events to one-on-one tutoring and mentoring for young men in high school. Adopt-A-School partners have contributed more than \$144,000 in in-kind donations and \$40,000 in monetary donations in two years.

Here is a sample of PPS Adopt-A-School partnerships:

- Second Chance Church built and installed Little Free Pantries at six schools, allowing the community to give and take as needed. Donations left include non-perishable food, hygiene items and school supplies.
- Friday Snack-Pack programs, which give students food to take home for the weekend, has expanded from serving 1,300 students per week to over 2,500.
- Girls Light Our Way (GLOW) hosted a Saturday Financial Literacy Workshop for 49 middle and high school girls.

- Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity members provide a mentoring program for high school boys. *Go To High School, Go To College* meets twice each month after school and on occasional Saturdays. Recently, boys in the program spent a Saturday volunteering at First United Methodist Church Loaves and Fishes food and clothing pantry.
- Franklin Primary School 4<sup>th</sup> grade students are working with WTVP volunteers to develop a leadership/broadcast team.
- Class Act Etiquette owner Cindy Winkler has taught after-school programs this year at Lincoln K-8. The weekly classes, one for 6<sup>th</sup> grade girls and another for 6<sup>th</sup> grade boys, covered manners, social media etiquette, public speaking, dining etiquette and more.
- Methodist College provides Sterling Middle School volunteer time for mentoring and tutoring as well as in-kind donations for PBIS behavior incentives and staff appreciation events.
- Recently, leaders of St. Paul Baptist Church visited Adopt-A-School partner Von Steuben Middle School at lunch time with a video camera in hand. They spent time asking students to tell them what *they* want from their community. Showing the video to their church members turned out to be a great way to recruit volunteers and gave them solid ideas on how to best help the school community.

I believe that support from the Peoria community, including Adopt-A-School, is resulting in better students and stronger, more successful schools. As reported by the 2017 Illinois school report card, for grades 3 – 8, every grade level and 15 schools showed gains in PARCC assessment scores. The 2018 assessment is now underway.

# Staying Safe from Tax Scams

Though Benjamin Franklin is often quoted as saying “in this world, nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes,” an updated version for the current day would need to include tax scams. As people nationwide seek to file their tax returns, cybercriminals attempt to take advantage of this with a variety of scams. Hundreds of thousands of U.S. citizens are targeted by tax scams each year, often only learning of the crime after having their legitimate returns rejected by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) because scammers have already fraudulently filed taxes in their name. The IRS reported a 400% rise in phishing scams from the 2015 to the 2016 tax season. In the state, local, tribal, and territorial government sector during 2017, approximately 30% of all reported data breach incidents were related to the theft of W-2 information, which was likely used for tax fraud.

### **How is Tax Fraud Perpetrated?**

Unfortunately, much of your personal information can be gathered from multiple locations online with almost *no verification* that the right person is receiving the information. Criminals know this, so they use this trick to get your personal information from a variety of websites and use the information to file a fake tax refund request! If a criminal files a tax return in your name before you do, they will file it with false information to get a large refund, forcing you to go through the arduous process of proving that you did not file the return and subsequently correcting the return. Once they have your personal information, criminals can continue to commit identity theft well beyond the tax season.

*Another way criminals gather your information is through the W-2 variant of the [Business Email Compromise scam](#). Criminals using this scam trick others into providing your personal information.*

Another favorite technique used by criminals during the tax season is sending phishing messages indicating that a new copy of your tax form(s) is available. These emails often impersonate state, local, tribal, and territorial government comptroller and/or IT departments. They might include a link to a phishing website that uses your organization’s logo and the email might even have the right signature line. If you fill out or attempt to login into the phishing website, the criminals will be able to see your login name and password, which they can then use to try and compromise your other accounts. The more information they gather from you, the easier it is for them to use the information to file a fake tax return in your name.

Tax fraudsters also impersonate the IRS and other tax officials to threaten taxpayers with penalties if they do not make an immediate payment. This contact may occur through websites, emails, or threatening calls and text messages that look official but are not. Sometimes, criminals request their victims pay the “penalties” via strange methods like gift cards or prepaid credit cards. It is important to remember:

- The IRS will not initiate contact about payment with taxpayers by phone, email, text messages, or social media without sending an official letter in the mail first.

- The IRS will not call to demand immediate payment over the phone using a specific payment method such as a debit/credit card, a prepaid card, a gift card, or a wire transfer.
- The IRS will not threaten to immediately notify local police or other law-enforcement agencies to have you arrested for not paying.
- The IRS will not demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount you owe.

### What Can You Do?

Here are some basic tips to help you minimize the chances of becoming a victim of a tax scam:

- If you haven't already, file your taxes as soon as you can...before the scammers do it!
- Be aware of phone calls, emails, and websites that try to get your information, or pressure you to make a payment. If something seems suspicious, contact the organization through a known method, like their publicly posted customer service line.
- Ignore emails and texts asking for personal or tax information. Be cautious as to whom you provide your information, including your Social Security Number and date of birth.
- Don't click on unknown links or links from unsolicited messages. Type the verified, real organizational website into your web browser.
- Don't open attachments from unsolicited messages, as they may contain malware.
- Only conduct financial business over trusted websites. Don't use public, guest, free, or insecure Wi-Fi networks.
- Remember, the "HTTPS" does not mean a site is legitimate.
- Shred all unneeded or old documents containing confidential and financial information.
- Check your credit report regularly for unauthorized activity. Consider putting a security freeze on your credit file with the major credit bureaus if you suspect you have been targeted for identity theft.

If you receive a tax-related phishing or suspicious email at work, report it according to your cybersecurity policy. The IRS encourages taxpayers to send suspicious emails related to tax fraud to its [phishing@irs.gov](mailto:phishing@irs.gov) email account or to call the IRS at 800-908-4490. More information about tax scams is available on the [IRS website](#) and in the [IRS Dirty Dozen](#) list of tax scams.

If you suspect you have become a victim of tax fraud or identity theft, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) [Identity Theft website](#) will provide a step-by-step recovery plan. It also allows you to report if someone has filed a tax return fraudulently in your name, if your information was exposed in a major data breach, and many other types of fraud.




### Year to Date % Chg - 2018 vs. the 5 Year Avg (2013-2017)



\*\*\*The above chart represents the 2018 crime statistics percent change from the five year average (2013-2017).

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
