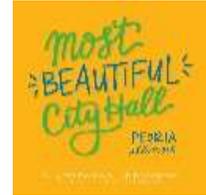

Community Development— Community Development Department Receives IHDA Grant

The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) has announced an Abandoned Property Program Round Three grant award to the City of Peoria Community Development Department in the amount of \$106,164.43. The funds will be used for demolition and lot clearing in the 61605 zip code in the City of Peoria. Since 2015, the Department has been awarded over \$330,000 in IHDA's Abandoned Property Program funds for demolition.

First District Councilwoman Denise Moore said, "the demolition of blighted properties reduces crime and arson, increases the value of surrounding properties, and demonstrates a commitment to make our neighborhoods a better place to live." In 2018, the City has spent over \$450,000 demolishing 40 houses. In 2017, 74 structures were demolished, with a total cost over \$1,000,000.

Before each house is demolished, Community Development staff evaluates the house for the potential of rehabilitation instead of demolition. Most houses that have demolition orders have no plumbing, electrical, or HVAC systems intact. Demolition is a last resort for structures that are not feasible for rehabilitation. The houses that are demolished are a harbor for criminal activity and create a nuisance to neighbors.

Students learned about the unique challenges and problems facing Peoria from a Community Development perspective ranging from homelessness and affordable housing to neighborhood building and civic engagement.

Sweet surprise turns to sweet ride

A young pizza ranch employee received the surprise of his life this week.

After coworkers recognized the man walked several miles to work, they decided to pool their resources and change that.

Jarvis Phipps loves his job at Pizza Ranch, but the 18-year-old had some difficulty getting there. That all that changed though after *one* surprise turned into *four* wheels.

Jace Perreault, Regional Marketing Manager for the pizza chain says Phipps is a model employee. *"He's a hard worker. He's dedicated."* Perreault bragged

Phipps usually has to clock in by 4pm each day, a task he takes seriously and there's two main things that he says characterize his work ethic.

"Getting to the job on time and being responsible" declared Phipps.

In order to do that, he would make close to a two and a half mile trek to work, no matter the circumstance.

"It was definitely difficult. Especially on days where it was windy and rainy. I mean c'mon it's Illinois. The weather was changing every single day. Sometimes I would have to layer and put a hoodie over my coat." Phipps detailed the various inclement weather conditions he'd walk, which included a route alongside the highway where there's barely a sidewalk.

So the Pizza Ranch employees masterminded a plan to buy a car for their fellow coworker. It took almost four months.

Perreault says Pizza Ranch isn't like the average employer. They operate like a family and choose employees at random, to help out when they see a need. This time it was Jarvis. So they called a meeting and brainstormed ways to achieve their plan. *"We started saving money. We started saving our tips and saving...whatever we could to do make it happen for him."* he explained.

When they finally presented the car to Phipps, Perreault says the moment was priceless.

"It was a really amazing feeling. It was just really unexplainable. I've been wanting this for such a long time." beamed Phipps as he shared his reaction to the surprise.

Although this car was a gift for Jarvis, both he and the Pizza Ranch family say it symbolizes a lot more than a present. It's about access.

"Transportation is huge. People who rely on the bus system or they do have to walk....it makes things really difficult for em sometimes." said Perreault.

Phipps says while he could have taken the bus, he was trying really hard to save for a car. He'd set aside almost \$800 when he was gifted the Chevy Impala. Now that he can cruise around the city, it makes all the difference for him.

"I get here a lot faster," Phipps said through laughter. "And its great to have the freedom to be social." He adds that this gift proves to him that there's still good people in the world and he plans on paying it forward.

Peoria Public Schools – Update from Superintendent Dr. Sharon Desmoulin-Kherat

At this week's PPS Board of Education meeting, Director of Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Derrick Booth shared the following information about 61605-zip code, the part of Peoria served by Trewyn School, Manual Academy, Roosevelt Magnet School and Harrison Community Learning Center :

- The median household in 61605 is nearly \$30,000 lower than that in the rest of Peoria.
- Life expectancy for males in 61605 is ten years less than for males in the rest of Peoria.
- According to the Economic Innovation Group Distress Index only one zip code in Illinois and 48 in the entire nation are more economically distressed than 61605.
- In 1980, 61605 was home to 26,458 Peorians and the population was approximately half white and half black. By 2014, the population had declined by 12,143, about 70 percent black and 30 percent white.

In human terms, these numbers translate to chronic trauma for 61605 families and children. The problems faced by families are huge: physical and mental health issues including depression, anxiety and substance abuse; issues of abuse, neglect, lack of love and care, abandonment, homelessness, malnutrition and the inability to access services and resources. As we were painfully reminded last weekend, loss of life from gun violence is real.

Our teachers see this every day. Trauma impacts children's ability to concentrate or find joy in learning and achievement. The natural fight or flight instinct brought on by trauma engenders aggressiveness, bullying, disrespect and hopelessness.

The concept of wrap-around services PPS is establishing at Trewyn School addresses the causes and results of trauma and chronic crisis. A key component of wrap-around services is a \$1.1 million grant recently made to OSF Healthcare from the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority to fund a Trauma Recover Center (TRC). Working from Trewyn and Manual Academy, the TRC will serve the trauma recovery needs of victims of violent crime, including PPS students and their families.

In addition to trauma recovery, Trewyn School, in partnership with 19 (and growing) community organizations, will offer services in a wide-range of areas including:

- Physical, mental and emotional health and wellness;
- Basic needs such as food, clothing, housing assistance, access to technology and transportation;
- Financial education, job-search assistance, adult education, parenting classes;
- Before- and after-school programs and summer and school intercession programs;
- College and career transition assistance;
- Safety and justice services including legal aid, probation/parole services and personal safety training.

PPS administrators have studied the success of similar trauma recovery and wrap-around community service programs in California and Georgia. By providing workspace at Trewyn for organizations addressing a variety of needs, we will connect families to services quickly and efficiently. Families in crisis, who frequently do not have transportation, will find help under one roof. I believe this concept can move 61605 residents to lives of empowerment.

It is important to note that the TRC and wrap-around services will not be offered exclusively to PPS families and students. The services based at Trewyn and Manual will be offered to any 61605 resident and residents from other parts of Peoria.

For too long our schools have focused on only academic issues but successful adults must have healthy social and emotional skills to manage adversity. The Trewyn Therapeutic Program (TPP), which serves 107 students, is demonstrating how focusing on SEL can transform students' lives. This program will also grow at the Trewyn site next school year. Illinois American Water to Conduct Fire Hydrant Flushing and Treatment Change

Beginning April 15, 2018 and lasting for about four weeks, Illinois American Water's Peoria District will conduct an annual maintenance program that includes a temporary treatment change to "free chlorine" as well as fire hydrant and water main flushing. This program helps to ensure continued delivery of high-quality water service to homes and businesses.

During this time Illinois American Water will switch to a form of chlorine known as "free chlorine," which does not contain ammonia. This stronger disinfectant is typically used when flushing water mains. Chlorine is commonly used in public water systems as a disinfectant and is monitored closely by our water quality professionals.

Institutions with additional water purification filters for special needs, for instance Hospitals and Dialysis Centers, have been contacted about this work and are aware of the treatment change. Anyone with questions about home health care equipment should reach out to their healthcare provider.

During the temporary treatment change, customers may experience a more noticeable chlorine taste or odor in their water. There is no reason for concern. This is due to the switch in chlorine types. Annual fire hydrant inspection and water main flushing will also be taking place to ensure continued water quality and fire hydrant operation for public safety.

When Illinois American Water crews are working, customers may experience a temporary drop in water pressure or draw some discolored water for a short period of time. If discolored water occurs, it is recommended that customers let their cold water run to clear before using it again and refrain from doing laundry during that time. The maintenance program may temporarily affect customers in Peoria, Bartonville, West Peoria, Rome and surrounding areas, as well as, sale-for-resale (wholesale) communities.

Securing Devices by Making Simple Changes

I'm connected. You're connected. We're all connected!

We are more connected than ever before. According to ABI Research, there will be over 30 billion devices connected on the Internet by 2020. Today, our everyday devices are connected to the world including laptops, mobile phones, fitness trackers, smart televisions, home security systems, thermostats, and refrigerators. Additionally, let us not forget the devices that connect everything else together, such as routers, access points, and modems.

Many people may not consider their connected devices to be a security threat, but they absolutely can be. One of the issues with such devices is that many of them do not come configured with security in mind and connecting an unsecure device to your network is like leaving the back door to your house unlocked as it gives attackers access to your personal information. Manufacturers develop products to be more accessible, more user friendly, and to make our lives more integrated. However, that also means we are less secure if these devices are not properly configured. Unfortunately, some devices completely lack the option or ability to configure them, making it nearly impossible to secure them. Unsecure devices also give threat actors the means to propagate their attacks onto others by using your insecure devices to attack other networks and devices. Therefore, not only can your unsecure devices present a risk to you, but they can also become a risk to others who can be victims of an attack from your compromised devices.

Do Your Research

You should do your research before purchasing a connected device, especially a device that may allow someone access into your home, such as a surveillance camera or home security system. Check the online reviews and look at the company's website to determine if there are warnings about the security of the device and if the company issues updates/patches to fix security concerns.

What Can You Do to Secure Your Devices?

So, what can you do to enjoy the functionality of your connected devices and remain more secure at the same time?

When you first receive your device, check the default settings and choose the more secure options, such as enabling a password or changing the default password to something only you know. Below is a list of these basic recommendations and some effective ones that may be less obvious choices.

- Network access or Internet access may be enabled on a device by default. Disable network/Internet access for devices that do not need it.
- Update the device operating system or firmware. The default operating software installed on a device may be out of date and/or contain many vulnerabilities. Updating or patching your device's software will reduce the chances of a successful attack.
- Wireless access points (APs) are oftentimes configured to broadcast the SSID, or network name, Consider changing these settings to turn this feature off, which can better secure your WiFi network.
- Create two different WiFi networks on your wireless router, if your router supports it. Creating separate WiFi networks, using different SSIDs, allows for the ability to separate smart devices from other networked computers, smart phones and tablets. The goal of the separation is to limit the impact a compromised smart home device will have on the rest of the devices on the network.
- Oftentimes, Wireless access points or routers are set up by default to not use encryption and to not require a password. It is always recommended to turn on WPA2 encryption for your wireless networks, and to establish a strong password with our next recommendation in mind.
- Change passwords on all network devices, especially from default "admin" accounts, and be sure to use strong passwords of at least 8 characters including uppercase and lowercase letters, special characters, and numbers.
- Many mobile devices have no PIN or unlock pattern (where you swipe your finger in a specific pattern on the screen) enabled when sold. Be sure to enable PINs or unlock patterns for all your mobile devices to secure them from unwanted entry by others.
- Automatic updates are often disabled by default. Be sure to turn on this setting to ensure your device receives important security updates when they are released.
- Many mobile devices support remotely wiping the device if the device is lost or stolen. Be sure to enable the remote wipe functionality in case the device is ever lost or stolen.
- Turn off location services if not needed.
- Cameras and audio input may be enabled by default on certain devices and applications, giving an attacker access to surveillance. Disable these features if not needed.
- Replace unsecure devices with more secure ones.






Peoria Cares Communication Transactions During the Month of March 2018


Peoria Cares March 2018 Complaint Status
